Kikuyu - Weed of the month



This spreading grass is rightly listed as a Weed of National Significance because of its ability to smother other vegetation and form a monoculture. This time of year is often a good time to control it because the green colour stands out against the dry grass, but this unusually wet summer is a little different! Kikuyu can be controlled by digging it out, use of approved herbicides or smothering with black plastic, cardboard or equivalent.

Carbon Farming trial

Totally Renewable Phillip Island (TRPI), is one year into a two year project of trialling carbon farming on five Phillip Island farms. They wish to expand the trial and seek three further farms. Ideally the area to be trialled would be 10 acres or more. Pre and post soil measurements are paid by TRPI. Then working together with TRPI, the landholder looks to encourage carbon sequestration by introducing regenerative farming practices.
